

Hate Crimes

A crime against a person or property motivated by bias toward race, religions, ethnicity/national origin, disability, or sexual orientation .

Manslaughter—Criminal Homicide by Negligence:

The killing of another person through gross negligence.

Motor Vehicle Theft:

The theft or attempted theft of a motor vehicle (Classify as motor vehicle theft all cases where automobiles are taken by persons not having lawful access even though the vehicles are later abandoned; includes joyriding).

Robbery:

The willful (non-negligent) killing of one human being by another. Divided into two classes: lawful and unlawful.

The taking or attempting to take anything of value from the care, custody, or control of a person or persons by force or threat of force or violence and/or by putting the victim in fear.

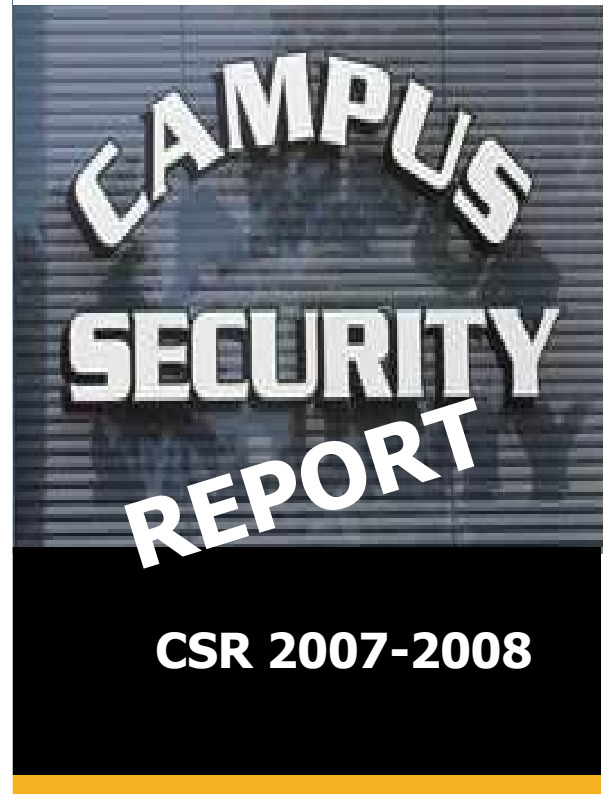
Sex Offenses (Forcible and Non-Forcible)

Forcible: Any sexual act directed against another person, forcibly and/or against that person's will; or not forcibly or against the person's will where the victim is incapable of giving consent. Includes rape, sodomy, sexual assault with an object or forcible fondling.

Non-forcible: Unlawful, non-forcible sexual intercourse. Includes incest and statutory rape.

Introduction

The collection and reporting of campus criminal activity is a requirement of federal law and an important part of the college's Campus Security function. The law was originally named the Student Right To Know And Campus Security Act [20 USC Section 1092 (f) (1) (1)]. The original 1990 legislation has been amended several times and renamed the Clery Act in memory of Jeanne Clery, a victim of on-campus rape and murder whose tragic loss was instrumental in developing the legislation which followed.

Temple Baptist College is blessed in that it has not experienced any significant number of serious crimes. Nevertheless, it is imperative that students and college employees stay alert to the possibilities of crime. By doing this, the College will be better equipped to prevent future incidents. The need for specific security—related policies and procedures and adherence to good security practices for the campus community is vitally important. Please read the information in this brochure so that you will have an accurate and realistic understanding of how you can join us in taking responsibility for your safety. We are pleased to have you as part of the Temple Baptist College family and pledge to work with you in making your educational and work experience an positive and enjoyable one.

Campus Crime Log

All crimes reported as having occurred in any geographic area covered by the annual Campus Security Report shall be made available in the Student Services Office for public inspection upon request during normal working hours. An electronic copy of the CSR is available through the college website. Crime statistics will also be reported to the U.S. Department of Education.

Crime Prevention

We believe that most crimes are preventable. The college's crime prevention program is based upon the dual concepts of eliminating or minimizing criminal opportunities, when ever possible, and encouraging faculty, staff, students, and guests to be responsible for both their own security and the security of others.

Crime Reporting

On-campus criminal activities and emergencies should be reported immediately to the Dean of Men or the Dean of Women, either in person or by telephone. These on-campus incidents will be investigated by the college officials to gather information and take appropriate action.

Off-campus crimes should be reported to the police department having legal jurisdiction for that area.

Student Responsibility

The cooperation, involvement, and personal support of students in a campus safety program is crucial to the success of the program. Student must assume responsibility for their personal belongings by taking simple, common sense precautions.

The student's awareness of their environment is the best place to start.

Crime Advisories

The purpose of a timely advisory is to alert the campus community to the occurrence of a crime in a manner that will aid in the prevention of similar crimes. The trigger for a timely advisory is a determination by the institution that the reported crime is considered to pose a threat to other students and employees. Advisories are distributed by postings in campus facilities and through email to faculty, staff and students.

Arson:

Any willful or malicious burning or attempt to burn, with or without intend to defraud, a dwelling, public building, motor vehicles or aircraft, personal property of another, etc.

Aggravated Assault:

An unlawful attack by one person upon an other for the purpose of inflicting severe aggravated bodily injury. This type of assault usually is accompanied by the use of a weapon or by means likely to produce death or great bodily harm.

Burglary:

The unlawful entry of a structure to commit a felony or a theft. For reporting purposes, this definition includes: unlawful entry with intent to commit a larceny or felony; breaking and entering with intent to commit a larceny; housebreaking; safecracking; and all attempts to commit any of the aforementioned.
